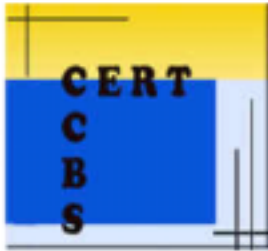

Professor John Keane is recognized around the world for his contribution to studies in media and democracy, civil society, and European citizenship. He has been at the cutting edge of some of the most innovative contemporary work in political and social thought. Among his many books are *The Media and Democracy*, which has been translated into more than twenty-five languages; *Democracy and Civil Society*; the prize-winning biography *Tom Paine: A Political Life*; and a study of power, *Václav Havel: A Political Tragedy in Six Acts*. Among his most recent works are *Violence and Democracy*, and *Global Civil Society*.

A coordinator of the European Commission-funded Civil Society Network (CiSoNet) and a member of the American-based Institutions of Democracy Commission, he is currently completing a full-scale history of democracy - the first for over a century.

Professor Keane is Founder and Director, Centre for the Study of Democracy, Professor of Politics, The University of Westminster, Professor and Senior Fellow, Wissenschaftszentrum Berlin, and Rajni Kothari Professor, Centre for the Study of Developing Societies, Delhi, India.
